


How can you help?

In stark contrast to what is pictured as a cold and barren groundbreaking ceremony with Mr. and Mrs. Boles in 1924, November 16, 2024, was bright, sunny, and beautiful. Arms of Hope – Boles Campus spent the day celebrating God's providence over the place that has served the "least of these" for one hundred years. The event was attended by over 300 people, including past and present residents, board members, staff, and local politicians attending to express support for the good work

done through the years. A new memory room, created in the administration building at the front of campus, was quickly packed by the former residents thumbing through pictures and laughing with the memory of bygone days. The time of fellowship was followed by lunch and a ceremony at the Chapel of Hope. Graham Sweeney, Master of Ceremonies and a long-time supporter and former superintendent of Boles ISD, welcomed the crowd and introduced the speakers. Troy Robert-

son, Arms of Hope ČEO, discussed how Arms of Hope – Boles Campus currently serves those in need. Joel Derrough, Executive Director – Boles Campus, discussed the history of Boles Home. Randa Upp, current Arms of Hope Board Member, shared a memory of her father, Randy Nicholson, who lived at Boles Home as a child. There was a special acknowledgment by Jill Dutton, Texas House Representative, who presented a flag flown over the Capitol building in Austin and shared

her thanks and memory from volunteering as a child at the Boles Campus. The famed Bel Canto Chorus provided the highlight of the day, coming together once again in an impromptu lifting of voices to God in praise of all He has provided these many years. The gift from Mr. and Mrs. Boles in their 60th year of life was a dream of helping children have a place they could call home. That dream is more alive than ever. Joel Derrough recalled the words from Mrs. Boles in 1931, as she saw

the impact of that gift, "See what God hath wrought through the instrumentality of Christians and friends of the Home. Surely our dreams have come true!" Joel expanded on this praise by asking those in attendance to consider what "the chances were" of Boles Home after all these years. He said, "The chances weren't long my friends, the chances of Boles existing, thriving, and serving for over 100 years wasn't a chance at all, it was God ordained and I pray for God's blessing for another 100

years." A few days later there was also special acknowledgment from Keith Self, Representative of Texas to the United States Congress, recognizing Boles' 100 years of service. We thank each of you who has walked with us on this journey, supporting Arms of Hope-Boles Campus through your prayers, sacrificial labors, and generous gifts. We praise God for, and pray God's best, for those ministered to so far and those we seek to reach in future generations.





My name is Bayley and I am a 17-yearold junior at Boles High School. I was raised by my mom in Trinidad, Colorado, along with my three younger siblings. At the time, my mom struggled to raise the four of us while working. She did the best that she could, but she needed help and I needed more guidance in my life. When I was in kindergarten, I was held back. I had started late in the school semester because my mom didn't have the means to send me to school when I was supposed to go. We basically lived in a shed for that year of my life. As I got older, I had to help raise my younger siblings while my mom worked odd hours during the week. I was not able to be a kid and have a normal childhood. Due to the stress of having to be a "parent" when I was 10 years old, I started to smoke weed and involved myself in other bad habits to cope with my anxiety. The bad habits got out of control around age 14 and I became reckless and carefree, not worrying about the future or understanding the consequences of my actions. Due to my poor attitude and because I was worried for my future, my mom contacted Arms of Hope where both her step-mom and sister, Shelby, worked. I came to Arms of Hope at the beginning of my sophomore year to begin the necessary measures to get out of the rut I was in mentally as well as to work on my addictive personality and bad habits. I struggled to understand why certain things were implemented but soon learned that they were normal and for my safety. Working with my counselor, case manager, and house parents, I have found true relationships and learned to trust adults with my well-being. I still struggle with impulsiveness but know that talking through ideas and fleshing out details helps me understand the big picture. I received the help I needed in school and have been on the A/B Honor Roll my entire Junior Year, an accomplishment I

would have never thought possible had it not been for Arms of Hope and Boles ISD. I am actively involved with the Student Council and FFA at Boles, I even competed last year across Texas with my metal work project, a two-person bench, which is now located at the Chapel of Hope on the Boles Campus. At Arms of Hope, I am learning to be more self-aware of my feelings and triggers and how to properly cope with the stress and anxiety that comes with life. Arms of Hope has also helped me with following my passion and I am currently working with the Cash Volunteer Fire Department to see if I want to pursue a career as a first responder after I graduate next year. I will obtain my driver's license on my 18th birthday this April and am excited to get a job, earning money towards a vehicle. Arms of Hope has helped me become a responsible and better person and I'm so thankful I came here.



My name is Patricio and I am a sophomore psychology major at the University of Notre Dame. I was born in Santa Clara, California and I had a great childhood until 2010, when cartel violence escalated. During this difficult time, my uncle was murdered by the cartel, and my family and I were forced to flee to Dallas, Texas. It was a difficult transition, we didn't have much money and I was forced to grow up quickly so that I could be helpful to my mother and younger siblings. In my senior year of high school, my family and I attended Skillman Church of Christ, and our dear friends Ken and Linda Henry informed me about how Arms of Hope supports college students that come from families in poverty. I was so excited to be accepted into this program. During my

first summer in the program in 2023, I was offered an opportunity to go to summer camp with everyone from the Boles Campus. I was baptized that week with my Arms of Hope family around me. I was presented with another fantastic opportunity in the summer of 2024. I joined a team of residents from Arms of Hope that would be traveling to Zambia with an organization called Living Water International. It was one of the most meaningful experiences in my life to help dig a water well. I was reminded of my purpose in life while providing basic needs for the people of Zambia and teaching them about God, who watches over us all. I have always believed that the unexpected usually stimulates the most growth in our lives. I never knew that Arms of Hope existed before attending Skillman Church of Christ. I never saw myself traveling to Africa at 19 for a mission trip. Arms of Hope has provided me with so much. They have helped me achieve financial stability, helped me grow as an individual, and the staff are true friends that I now see as my family. My program consists of working closely with my Arms of Hope counselor and case manager to keep me emotionally healthy and focused. I have over a 3.0 GPA. I attend a great church and participate in amazing spiritual activities in the summer. With all the help received from these wonderful people, I have understood more about who I am and who God is. I am living a secure life for which I will be forever grateful.



My name is Natalie. I am a mom of three and we are all survivors of domestic violence. Growing up in a single-parent home wasn't easy on me emotionally, however I always had my mother and Lita (Grandmother). A little over 5 years ago, I lost both of them. I began to blame myself for their loss and things became worse in my marriage. The relationship was abusive from the beginning. Both of us were using drugs and alcohol and after I lost my mom, the abuse at home became worse. There were several times I would walk around with black eyes, hoping no one would notice. I had a plan to leave but, like most women stuck in a domestic violence situation, I had a hard time executing that plan. One particular incident lasted two days and ended with the police directing me and my boys to a family violence center. I allowed the man back in. Afterwards, the violence increased significantly and the Department of Family Protective Services became involved and put a safety plan in place. Two weeks later, two of my children and I were assaulted by a family member, resulting in my youngest having to call the police. I remember sitting outside, crying and praying, thinking that we had no safe place to go. We fled again to a family violence center and then we found Arms of Hope. It's amazing how God can orchestrate everything in exactly the right way and answer your prayers, connecting you with individuals who truly care. The boys and I have been at AOH for two years and are doing so well! As a family, we have attended a Family Camp and campus-wide events, AOH holiday parties, and campus-wide worship. I have completed a "Breaking Free Class" led by strong women and "Love and Logic" parenting classes. I've attended the Heart of Motherhood Retreat, the Kerrville Church of Christ Women's Retreat, domestic violence classes, and weekly devotionals. I attend Abilene Christian University Online and am working on my Bachelor of Science degree in Psychology, while the boys and I continue weekly therapy sessions. Recently, the boys and I received news that their father, my abuser, had died from a heart attack due to his drug use. This took a heavy emotional toll on us. Our Arms of Hope family was right there. Our therapists were literally at our house within 25 minutes of receiving the news. The program director drove with me to Austin to pick up his cremated remains, the campus minister sent us scriptures, others lifted us up in prayer, and the entire community rallied around us. I have no words to describe the love and support we received. I attend recovery meetings three times a week to make sure my recovery remains a priority. I also drive new moms to recovery meetings because I remember being in their same position and it is a way for me to do service work and contribute to our AOH community. I know what a dark place I have come from and what addiction can do to families and I know there is a better way. God is good! My boys continue to excel in school and sports. The healing and growth we have experienced is completely amazing, and we are not done yet. I am beyond grateful for my Arms of Hope family!



My name is Cassie and I am so thankful for the ministry at the Arms of Hope Family Outreach Center. Three years ago, my three young children and I were able to leave an abusive situation because of the help from Arms of Hope. At the time, my ex-husband and I had already separated and gotten back together, mainly because I did not have the resources to leave with my children. I had been a stay-at-home mom for ten years, and did not have any family support. When I first came to the Arms of Hope Family Outreach Center I was scared, anxious, sad, depressed, and angry. I felt so overwhelmed and wasn't sure if I would be able to handle all that was on my plate by myself. Luckily, I did not have to. The support and encouragement I received from the start at Arms of

Hope was enough to get me through. After getting into therapy for myself and my children, we were able to work through all the grief that came with the divorce. My oldest daughter was able to participate in horse therapy, and my son did play therapy at a local ranch. My kids greatly benefited from therapy during this tough time. Having the support of Arms of Hope spiritually, emotionally, and financially was a huge stepping stone to where my children and I are now. We started off in a little two-bedroom apartment where we first called home and our family of four made it work. I was a special education paraprofessional that year and would eventually be offered a position teaching Kindergarten full time at the school my children were attending. The following year, the kids and I moved into

a brand-new apartment, and I was able to get the lease fully in my name. After living there for two years, working on my finances and closely following the budget that I learned to create at Arms of Hope, the children and I recently were able to move out and into a fourbedroom house. This has been such a tremendous blessing for us! We lived in a two-bedroom apartment for three years, and now all of my children have their very own bedrooms, a backyard, and a safe neighborhood to ride their bicycles. I'm thankful for God's faithfulness in providing for my family and for opening doors for us. Without the support and dedication of the staff at Arms of Hope, I am not sure my children and I would be where we are today.

This partnership holds 167 years of combined experience in caring for the physical, emotional, educational and spiritual needs of children and single-mother families. Although both organizations were originally created to serve as homes for orphans, Arms of Hope has expanded to serve the growing needs of at-risk children and families. Arms of Hope offers residential and outreach programs for children and single-mother families who are fleeing poverty, homelessness, abuse, neglect and human trafficking.

The Board of Directors of Arms of Hope operates with a high level of commitment to provide leadership, guidance and finances for the organization. Under the mentorship of the board, Arms of Hope's leadership team is in constant pursuit of improving program quality and increasing the number of poverty stricken children and single-mother families served throughout the state of Texas and beyond. All employees are committed and directed to limiting administrative expenses and follow a detailed and well thought out line-item budget to ensure that every donor dollar is spent to best benefit our residents.

Arms of Hope's annual budget for FY24 was \$8.75 million and the organization depended almost entirely on private monetary and clothing donations from generous individu-




als including donations of mineral rights, businesses, private foundations and churches to provide these invaluable services.

Almost all of the residents in Arms of Hope's programs are from Texas and 95% come from the urban areas and contiguous counties of Dallas/ Ft. Worth, Houston and San Antonio. The children and single mother families we serve are almost exclusively from three ethnic backgrounds with 42% being Hispanic, 34% African-American and 24% Caucasian. Children and young adults participating in Arms of Hope's programs range in age from birth to early twenties. The largest population of children in Arms of Hope's care were twelve years old and younger with 42% being 5 and under. Less than 3% of Arms of Hope residents come from homes with two parents. Most placements are a result of extreme poverty, failed adoptions, family members who can no longer take on parental responsibility, homelessness and all forms of abuse. Arms of Hope helps each resident succeed by having an in-depth "Plan of Service" that measures a variety of different areas in their life such as health & wellness,




ARMS OF HOPE PROGRAM PARTICIPANTS COME FROM VARIOUS LOCATIONS



emotional stability/counseling, social skills and education. 88% now receive better grades in school than when they first arrived in our care with an amazing 38% who are now on the Honor Roll. Extra-curricular activities are participated in by 85% of our school-aged children thanks to the support of our staff and resources provided by our programs.

Through our Christ-centered environment, 67% of all Arms of Hope residents have either experienced positive reunification with their families or graduated from one of our programs. Arms of Hope is truly making a difference for those impacted by adversity and loss of hope by providing programs offering physical, emotional & spiritual transformation.

22 Arms of Hope program participants became new followers of Christ this year.










All campus residents receive professional therapy.

Programs Offered on Arms of Hope's Three Residential Campuses and in its Urban Family Outreach Centers Include:

RESIDENTIAL CHILD CARE **PROGRAM**

The Residential Child Care Program meets disadvantaged children's physical, emotional, educational and spiritual needs in a family-like atmosphere, where house parents function as mother and father figures. Residents range in age from 5 to 18 and live in cottages with six to eight children. Arms of Hope provides for children's basic daily needs including shelter, food, clothing, counseling, supervision and education.



TOGETHER PROGRAM

The Together Program helps motivated single mothers and their children transition into successful, independent futures by providing counseling, accountability, parenting skills, career training and a home in a peaceful and safe environment. These mothers are fleeing homelessness, domestic violence, human trafficking, abuse or have lost sustainable support when a death, incarceration or divorce have occurred and there are no other means of provision.

COLLEGE & CAREER PROGRAM

The College and Career Program provides assistance for Arms of Hope high school graduates with support through college, trade school or into their first job and often includes accommodations for graduates, who have not yet found a place to call home.


RIGHT START PROGRAM

The Right Start Program helps expectant single mothers prepare for motherhood, while providing shelter, necessities and skills needed to care for their newborn babies. It serves as an entry point for women coming into the Together Program, who desire to be a parent and learn how to establish a healthy family environment for their children.

OUTREACH PROGRAM

Family Outreach Centers provide physical, emotional and spiritual assistance to underprivileged children and families in their own neighborhoods, which are some of the most financially distressed urban areas in Texas including Dallas, Denton, Houston and San Antonio. Arms of Hope provides short-term immediate assistance to prevent homelessness, hunger and disconnected utilities. Invaluable long-term resources are also offered to help change a person's future, such as in-depth case management, needs assessments, counseling and family workshops. All clients receive prayer, Bible study and church referrals. For those suffering from extreme abuse, Arms of Hope residential campuses become their new home.

Arms of Hope strongly believes in evangelism and discipleship. Through spiritual opportunities including regular church services, campus devotionals and Christian camps, 22 participants in our Residential Child Care, Together and Family Outreach Center programs became new followers of Christ in Fiscal Year 2024. All residents are given daily opportunities to grow in their faith by encountering house parents, case managers and counselors that show unconditional love and respect. Each campus has a dedicated minister specifically for residents' spiritual needs and the ministry team oversees all spiritual activities and devotional curriculum.



typically personified personal sacrifice, courage, and resilience. For a particular group of veterans, in addition to these traits, their journeys shared something else in common: growing up at Boles Children's Home. As part of the 100th year celebration for Arms of Hope's Boles Campus, Board Member Randa Upp began identifying the names of former residents who had served in the military. One hundred sixty-five veterans were found to have served in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, Merchant Marines, or the Coast Guard. This group spanned three major conflicts: World War II, Korean War, and Vietnam.

The following notable experiences and honors were found: one veteran fought in the Battle of the Bulge, one was present at Normandy on D-Day, three veterans were recipients of the Bronze Star, one received the Distinguished Flying Cross, six were awarded the Purple Heart, one was a Prisoner of War, one died in a non-battle accident, and one was killed in action in Japan. One veteran is honored at the Naval Air Museum in Pensacola and also has the main boulevard at the Coast Guard Aviation Training Center in Alabama dedicated to him. All of these veterans made invaluable contributions to our country, and their service remains a testament to their bravery, sacrifice, and dedication.

Arms of Hope would like to expand this project by creating a comprehensive document that honors the lives and service of all individuals who have been a part of the AOH family and later served in the military. If you or someone you know was a resident at the Boles or Medina campus and



Bruce Foith (1943-2024)





In the fall of 1964, Gerald began his 37-year teaching career at the Tabernacle Township school district in Tabernacle, New Jersey. After retiring, he continued to work in education as a substitute teacher. It is safe to say there is almost no one in Tabernacle between the ages of 15 and 60 that Gerald did not teach. His way with junior and senior high-age kids is baked into the lore of the community and while they will long remember 'frayed knots, Texas flyswatters, and "questions, comments, Ajax," his real legacy is the education they received both in curricular content and character development. He brought out the best in each student and many thought of him as the only Dallas Cowboy fan they not only liked, but loved. Underlying every aspect of his life was his faith, believing he had a charge to keep for as long as he lived. He was a dedicated member of the Tabernacle Church of Christ, serving in whatever capacity needed with humility, humor, and commitment, and making every visitor feel welcome. Although missed, we know Gerald is now in the arms of Jesus.


































Fund-A-Need

Daily Needs for Arms of Hope Residents

Includes food, clothing, shelter, school activities, loving house parents, medical/dental care and other necessities. 150 Children per year on the Boles and Medina Campuses \$75 per day per resident, \$2,000 per month, \$25,000 per year

Counseling for All Program Participants

Christian Licensed Professional Counselors \$70 per session (reduced rate), \$280 per month / \$2,700 per year

Daycare

Arms of Hope's Boles & Medina Campuses have 125 children in both state licensed daycares each day, which allows our single mothers to attend college or technical training. The 20 full-time staff members follow a Christian Curriculum and each child participates in devotionals. They receive meals and snacks each day. \$500,000 Per Year Total Operational Cost

Family Outreach Center
